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WHEREFORE THEN THE LAW?

Galatians 3:19.

Since it was not possible that any law. could be given that could have given life to dying men, and not possible that righteousness should come by the law, the question asked in verse 19 of chapter 3, naturally arises, "Wherefore then the law?" Why was there, between the giving of the promise to Abraham, and its fulfillment through Christ, that long and seemingly fruitless period of the law? What purpose did it serve? This is indeed a deeply interesting question; and to it the Epistle to the Galatians supplies an answer which, while not complete, is sufficient, and is pertinent to the special subject of this Epistle. The answer, given in few words, is: "It was added for the sake of transgression, until the Seed should have come to Whom the promise was made, having been ordained through angels in the hand of a mediator. Now a mediator is not of one; but God is one" (3:19 20, Gr.). This passage is not so clear as to be apprehended without effort; but it is well worth inquiring into. The statement that the law was "added" is significant. This indicates that the law was not a part of the scheme of redemption, directly contributing thereto, but was "added to" or superimposed upon that plan. T_0 the same effect it is said in Rom. 5:20. "Moreover the law entered," literally. came in by the way, as we would say of a thing not bearing directly upon, or contributing directly to the accomplishment of the matter in hand.

And here we would submit to the judgment of our readers a propostion which we deem to be important. This dispensation of the Holy Spirit is sometimes spoken of as a "parenthesis," that is to say, a matter not related directly to the main subject but which interrupts the course of the theme, and could be dropped out without being missed According to that idea, God's dealings with the nation Israel and His purpose for them are regarded as the essential features of His great plan for the ages the era of the turch being viewed as a "parenthesis," because it supposedly

breaks in upon God's dealings with Israel, which are to be resumed at the close of this dispensation.

But we maintain on the contrary that according to what is clearly stated in Galatians the main line of God's dealings is that of His covenant with Abraham and his Seed, leading into blessing to all the nations. In other words. God's main line of working is not "under the law," but "under the promise." For Abraham was never under the law. The law then and not the church-age was the "parenthesis," for it interrupted, during a period of about fifteen hundred years, God's dealings in the line of the promise, just as the Hagar episode was a "parenthesis" in Abraham's personal history, interrupting for a time his relations with the true wife, Sarah.

Moreover, the beginning and the ending of the parenthetical era of the law are definitely marked. The law was "four hundred and thirty years after" the promise (v. 17); and its duration was only "until the Seed should come to Whom the promise was made" (v. 19). Indeed the whole point of the argument here is that the law, being a parenthesis interposed between "the promise" and the "Seed" by Whom it was to be fulfilled, cannot be taken as disannulling or as modifying in anywise the terms of the promise. "The covenant that was confirmed before of God to (not in) Christ, the law, which was four hundred and thirty years after, cannot disannul' (v. 17). On the other hand, the law could not, and did not, promote in anywise the fulfillment of the promise "For if the inheritance be of the law"-that is, be attained through the instrumentality of the law---"it is no more of promise: but God gave it (the inheritance) to Abraham by promise" (v. 19). Hence the law had nothing to do with the accomplishment of the purpose in view in the giving of the promise.

It is, we think, highly important to grasp the fact that this present era of the Holy Spirit, so far from being a "parenthesis," interrupting the progress of God's main plan of operations, is in fact the very era that was in contemplation when God called Abraham and gave him the promises; and to grasp also the related fact that the law was truly a "parenthetical period, during which the execution of "the promise" was necessarily suspended.

The verse last quoted brings to view another characteristic word of the Epistle, namely, "the inheritance;" and we would take special notice of this word because the thought it conveys is intimately connected with what we regard as the main subject of the Epistle—"Our liberty in Christ."

But before considering the subject of the inheritance, we have to inquire lato the reason for the bringing in of the long period of the law, occupying about fifteen hundred years, thus greatly delaying the fulfillment of the promise, while not apparently contributing anything to its accomplishment. We may indeed be quite sure the era of the law was needed, and that it did not last a moment too long. For we have the explicit statement that "when the fulness of the time was come" then "God sent forth His Son" (4:4); and, of course, He could not have come any sooner. Hence the law filled up an interval of time which had to elapse in any case.

Another statement concerning the law is made in this connection, namely, that it could not be the agency whereby the promise was to be fulfilled and the inheritance gained. The reason is that, if the inheritance be gained by means of the law, it would no longer be by promise; and since God made it at the beginning a matter of promise, He could not change the character of His dealings and make it a thing to be gained through the law. An unconditional promise rests for its fulfillment solely upon the good faith of the one who makes it.

The bearing of this part of the argument will be evident if we keep in mind that the false teachers to whom the Galatians were listening were endeavoring to change the accomplishment

of God's purposes in His people from the basis of grace ("the promise") on which it rests secure, to the basis of human works ("the law"). So Paul strenuously insists that the bringing in of the period of law, which was only a parenthesis, did not and could not change either the basis on which God had caused His purpose to rest or the method of its accomplishment. God gave the inheritance to Abraham by promise; hence God must fulfill it anart from all works of law, and regardless of man's failure when tested by law. And just here we my anticipate our remarks concerning "the inheritance" to the extent of pointing out that the receiving of the Spirit is included in the inheritance, since the Spirit is "the Earnest of our inheritance until the redemption of the purchased possession" (Eph. 1:13, 14). We see then that all the inheritance of the sons of God must come to them by grace alone, that is, as the gift of God, apart from all works of their own.

We are now prepared for consideration of those rather obscure words: "It (the law) was ordained by angels in the hand of a mediator. Now a mediator is not of one, but God is One."

What comes into view here is the great difference between the two covenants, a difference illustrated by the remarkable allegory in chapter 4, to which allusion has already been made. point of difference indicated in the words last quoted is that the covenant of grace (the promise) has but one party to it-God. Himself: whereas the law was a two-part covenant; for it was ordained by the agency of angels in the hand of a mediator. Now a mediator is not (and cannot be) the mediator of one party. There must be two parties to a covenant (or agreement) made through the offices of a mediator. But God who made the promise is One.

The covenant of the law "from Mount Sinai" (4:25) was ratified between God and the children of Israel, that is, "Israel after the flesh" (1 Cor. 10:18). Hence it required for its fulfillment the full performance by both parties of all. their respective undertakings. But Israel broke that covenant less than forty days after it had been ratified (Exod. Thereupon, His covenant being broken (according to the words "Which My covenant they brake, saith the Lord" (Jer. 31:32), God, as the result of Moses' intercession, took them up again on a different basis, saying: "I will proclaim the Name of the Lord before thee, and will be gracious to whom I will be gracious, and will show mercy on whom I will show mercy" (Exod. 34:19). It was purely a matter of grace and in fulfilment of His promise to the fathers that God brought the people of Israel into Canaan. As stated by Jeremiah: "The people which were left of the sword found grace in the wilderness" (Jer 31:2). God was not bound by the covenant of Sinai any longer; though He continued His relations with Israel under the form of it.

But now, in view of what has been shown as to the impossibility of the covenant of law either changing or aiding the fulfilment of the promise, an-

other question arises: "Is the law then against the promises of God?" It might seem so. But such is not the case. God who made the promise Himself also gave the law. Hence the law could not be against the promise. In fact, the law might even have aided the promise if it could have given life. But, because of the infirmity of the flesh and the corruption of the heart of man, that which was "ordained to life" was ministration of death" and "the ministration of Moses' ministry of the old covenant became "the ministration of death" and "the ministration of condemnation" (2 Cor. 3:7, 9).

Thus the law served to make evident the true state of the natural man. It brought to light the fact of the utter ruin of the human race, proving that "the mind of the flesh is unmity against God, for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be" (Rom. 8: 7, R. V.). Needless to say, God could do nothing with a race of beings that was not subject and could not be made subject to His authority. The brief statement concerning the law that "it was added because of transgressions" can be understood in the light of other scriptures as signifying God's plan, through the trial of a selected nation by means of the law, to prove the necesslty for blood-redemption and a new birth, in other words the necessity for salvation by grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus. Thus we read in Romans 5:20, that "the law entered that the offence might abound:" and in Romans 7:7, 13, that the knowledge of sin came by the law, and that thereby sin became exceeding sinful." It is clear, therefore, that the law did

not change the condition of those who were directly under law, and was not intended to do so. It served rather to bring out and make evident the enmity and rebellion of the natural heart of man, thus showing the necessity of a change of heart, which is the work of this present age of grace.

This is the significance of verse 22 of our chapter (Galatians 3): "But the scripture hath concluded (lit., shut up) all things under sin that the promise (that is the Holy Spirit) might be given to them that believe." In what sense are we to understand that the scripture -the written law of God--has shut up all things (the "all" is neuter gender requiring the substantive "things") under sin? This must be understood in the sense that in the light of man's trial under the law, it is seen that the whole creation (man inheritance) is under the dominion of sin, and that there is need of redemption, not only of the persons of those whom God purposes to save, but of the "inheritance" as well.

Furthermore, the object of the law is declared to be "that every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may become guilty before God" (Rom. 3:19). This was manifestly a necessary preliminary to the dispensation of grace. For since God purposed to save men solely by grace, through faith, it was needful to show that all men, even the very best of them, were allke "guilty," and were equally dependent upon the undeserved

mercy of God. Pardon is not for the innocent, but for the guilty; hence a man must be convicted of sin before he will seek pardon or is eligible for it. God therefore gives to all men the opportunity now to own themselves "guilty" and to accept pardon as God's gracious gift through Jesus Christ, and on the righteous ground that He, the Just One, suffered for the sins of those who accept God's Mercy offered by the gospel.

But there was another distinct purpose of the law, namely, it served to guard or keep the nation of Israel as a separate people up to the time of the coming of Christ and His presentation of Himself to that people. For we must not suppose that the Word of God given to the Israelites was "of none effect" (see Rom. 9:6), even though the nation as a whole transgressed it. There was always, even when things were at their worst in Israel, a believing remnant (seven thousand even in the days of Ahab). Not that these kept the whole law or were saved by it; but they were "Israelites indeed," because they had "the circumcision of the heart." they were saved through faith. Paul has in mind this believing remnant whose hearts were perfect toward God, and who were always the real "Israel" (Rom. 9:6), known of God though unrecognized by the eye of man. For let us clearly understand that faith is always and altogether a matter of the heart. It is an attiude of the heart toward God, manifesting itself in a voluntary submission to His Word.

Paul speaks of those believing Israelites as minor children (and includes himself among them), saying: "We were kept (i. e., guarded) under the law, shut up unto the faith which should afterwards be revealed. Wherefore the law was our schoolmaster to bring us unto Christ, that we might be justified by faith. But after faith is come we are no longer under a schoolmaster" (v. 23-25). The word "pedagogue" (translated "schoolmaster") is compounded of two words meaning a child and to bring (or lead), the duty of the pedagogue being to take charge of the young children and bring them to school. Thus the pedagogue was responsible for the care of the children. But on the other hand the children were, in a sense, in bondage to the pedagogue. Thus Paul illustrates the law in its guardianship of the true-hearted Israelites. "The heir," he says, "as long as he is a child differeth nothing from a servant, though he be lord of all; but is under tutors and governors until the time appointed of the father. Even so, we, when we were children (minors) were in bondage under the elements of the world" (4:1-3).

Thus the law served a special purpose of guardianship over those who, like the writer of Psalm 119, loved the law of God, rejoiced in His statutes and judgments, and delighted greatly in His commandments. But that guardianship was only "unto Christ;" for, says Paul, "after that faith is come we are no longer under a pedagogue."

Is the Holy Spirit in All Believers?

(Continued from Previous, Issue.)

It is claimed by others that the epistles were only addressed to those who had been baptized in the Holy Spirit, and that only such are real Christians and members of the body of Christ. As proof of this they quote 1 Cor. 12:13, and assert that no one is born of God but those who have been baptized in the Spirit and speak in tongues, but we dissent from this, and maintain that the Baptism of the Spirit and the new birth cannot be synonomous, as the promise of the Father, the baptism in the Spirit, is to the children, and a child must be born before it can be baptized and this is just as true in the Spiritual as in the natural realm-a birth must preceed the baptism, for you cannot baptize nothing.

We do not wish to be dogmatic, but would suggest this thought, that the baptism in or by the Spirit referred to in 1 Corinthians 12:13, cannot mean the baptism in the Holy Ghost received on the day of Pentecost, and by numbers since, for the 120 who were tarrying in the Upper Room for the Promise of the Father, were all the children of that Father alive spiritually and physically, and already in the body of Christ by vir-. tue of their relationship to Christ who declared while yet with them that their names were written in heaven. And because they were sons God had already sent forth the Spirit of His Son into their hearts crying Abha, Father. (Gal. 4:5). The Spirit bearing witness with their spirits that they were the children of God, and with His love shed abroad in their hearts by the Holy Ghost, and this experience they had and carried with them into the upper room before they were baptized in the Holy Spirit and spake in tongues.

Are these promises just referred to as applying to the waiting ones at Jerusalem, without meaning or realization to a child of God today who has not yet received the fulness of the Spirit through the baptism?

Now the earnest of the Spirit implies a fuller realization of the Spirit, as earnest really means only a sample or foretaste of that which may be had without measure and may we not have this measure or earnest of the Spirit whereby we are sealed before being baptized in the Spirit?

And who has any authority to bar out from the body of Christ any true child of God yet unbaptized in the Spirit? They belong to the body by right of birth—not baptism, and the family of God, the body of Christ and the Church are all one and the same thing. In the natural order a child is born into the family, not baptized into it; so in the spiritual the same law holds good, and their relationship to God as children in the family constitutes them candidates for the baptism in the Spirit, and entitled to all the benefits of the household of God.

Reasoning to the contrary seems unscriptural and illogical.

It is a common fault to over-emphasize some statement of scripture, and stretch it to cover more than it does, not comparing scripture with scripture and endeavoring to rightly divide the word of truth.

We also know that it is difficult to reconcile some statements that seem to conflict. The word declares in Eph. 4:5 that there is but one baptism. Yet Jesus, who told His disciples to tarry at Jerusalem for the baptism in the Spirit, also commanded to baptize in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, the converts made through their ministry. Now here are two distinct baptisms, and they stand in contrast all through the Acts and the Epistles.

We would suggest that it is possible that there may be a phase of spiritual baptism which is not identical with the baptism in the Spirit—a baptism by the Spirit as well as in the Spirit. To adhere strictly to the word, it is not correct to speak of the Pentecostal baptism as the baptism of the Holy Ghost or by the Holy Ghost, but the baptism in, or into the Holy Ghost as the Holy Spirit does not baptize us into Himself. Jesus is distinctly declared to be the baptizer in the Holy Ghost. But if we turn to Rom. 6:3 we read, "Know ye not that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus," not into the Holy Spirit by Jesus. And this phase of baptism which brings a man into the one body occurs at regeneration; In fact produces it. See also Gal. 3:26 to end, where we have this assurance: "For ye are all the children of God hy faith in Jesus Christ. For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ.'

Now this being baptized into Christ cannot mean mere water baptism for it is a spiritual operation and experience nor is it the baptism into the Spirit as on the day of Pentecost, but a baptism into Christ. But to quote the rest of the chapter, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free; there is neither male nor female; for ye are all one in Christ Jesus. And if ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise." And this includes the promise of the Father, and we have got to be Abraham's seed by spiritual regeneration before we can receive this promise to the children.

Here is a baptism into Jesus by the Spirit in contrast with the baptism into the Spirit by Jesus.

As a further proof of the Spirit's presence in believers prior to their baptism in the Holy Spirit, we would call attention to 1st John 3:18 to 22, showing who are the recipients of the Spirit and the conditions of receiving Him.

"And this is His commandment, That we should believe on the name of His Son Jesus Christ and love one another, as He, Christ, gave us commandment. "And he that keepeth His commandments dwelleth in Him (Christ) and He in him; and hereby we know He abideth in us by the Spirit which He hath given

And in the 12th and 13th verses of the next chapter of this epistle we read: "If we love one another God (the Father) dwelleth in us and His love is perfected in us. Hereby we know that we dwell in Him (God) and He in us, because He hath given us of His Spirit." See also 2 Tim. 1:14.

Herein is revealed the oneness of the trinity, and if one is in us all are in. And no one can have eternal life who does not have the life giver and sustainer within, "Christ, the hope of glory." And the passages just quoted tell us that we only know this relationship by the Spirit that dwelleth in us. We repeat that we must be indwelt by the Trinity in order to have eternal life, or salvation, which is not possible with one person of the God-head on the outside; and this state and standing is a necessary preparation for the Baptism in the Spirit.

As in the past, so in the present, there are people who have not yet been baptized in the Spirit who know just as well that God is in them as do those who have received the baptism in the Holy Ghost.

We are quite conscious of the difficulty of trying to harmonize certain statements of scripture such as the "Holy Ghost was not yet given," and "Ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" with the position we are holding; and these and similar scriptures are cited to prove that no believer has the Holy Spirit in any sense until they are baptized in the Spirit, but it is a misapplication. The gift of the Holy Ghost and the baptism in the Spirit are synonymous terms and we believe it was God's provision for all in this dispensation to be baptized in the Spirit as soon as they repented and accepted Jesus; were justified, regenerated and sanctified, without the time feature seeming to enter into the operation. God could, and would, we believe, condense and focus all this so that it would all seem to be the result of the baptism in the Spirit, but God is not to be limited by our theological processes and will, if we are honest seekers, accommodate Himself to our dulness of apprehension and give us salvation apparently in installments. "According to your faith be it unto you."-J. T. Boddy.

It is estimated that more deaths occurred as the result of the recent scourge of Flu alone, than was occasioned by the great world-wide war. It is to be understood that what is here offered is suggestive only and is not intended otherwise.

A glance at the calendar shows us that the first week in May, 1921, begins with Sunday. Any program for Sunday should, of course, include the regular services usually held on that day. It is suggested, however, that there may be special attention given to prayer in the messages and that special time be given to prayer in these services, with at least one extra appointment for the day at which time prayer be made for the success of the Prayer Conferences everywhere, and for the special encouragement and equipment to pray that the Spirit alone can bring. It might well be a day in which the special thought should be, the divine equipment for prayer. Except we be able to "pray in the Holy Ghost" or, in other words, we have the spirit of prayer and intercession from the Lord, we shall not be such channels of prayer as God would use during the week for His glory, and the profit of such interests as may be brought forward upon our lips before Him.

On Monday, the special sessions can begin in earnest. Confident that the Holy Ghost will prompt us at once to pray for it, we suggest that the thought for the day be, a mighty outpouring of the Divine Spirit that will open doors everywhere and carry into them the true Pentecostal message. Many doors are opening, even some denominational churches are catching the divinely projected vision for these days, and are inviting into their midst a sane and scriptural Pentecostal spirit and mescriptural

sage. Much prayer may well be offered in behalf of these opening doors that they may swing wide and that there shall enter only what is of God.

For Tuesday, it is suggested that special prayer be made for conditions in Pentecostal circles all over the world. There are some unsatisfactory conditions with unprofitable divisions that have come in spite of our desire for unity and peace among us. Only God can make the needed corrections. Further needs are a deepening of the spiritual life of the saints, a quickening of the "blessed hope" among us, victory for healing for bodies, and co-operation in sending the gospel to all the world.

For Wednesday the suggestion is that it be Foreign Missionary Day, the program to comprehend the various mission fields of the world.

Thursday, prayer for unevangelized fields in this and other Home Lands.

Friday comes next and as we think of other needs and feel our hearts opening Godward, there comes the thought of the great need of a mighty refreshing and further empowering of the Pentecostal Ministry. This company of men and women who have given themselves to God for the ministry and who, many of them, feel their inability to adequately serve, on account of personal limitations, surely need God's very best empowerment and a constant refreshing in soul and body. It is therefore suggested that the thought for Friday be "The Ministry" and that we pray for the whole will of God concerning them. As one of them the writer is hopeful that God will answer the united prayers of the saints for us and that there may come from God a mighty awakening and blessed refreshing for the body of ministers as a whole.

The suggestion for Saturday is that it be given to prayer concerning "the Blessed Hope" and preparation of the saints for the coming of the Lord. A great quickening is needed and much desired among us. Prayer, much prayer, will help, we are sure. Every day now, we should live in expectancy of HIS coming. Definite preparation is widely needed. Some things are still in the way of complete readiness. All such must be put away and a blessed assurance must prevade not only individual lives, but the movement at large.

Finally, let us make Sunday, May 8th, a rally-day, when we shall come together, as many as possible, to look uphold up our hands, and with uplifted hearts, call upon God for "RAIN", a tremendous downpour of the Spirit, and let it mean what it will. Just call for it regardless of specializing, just let it come in mighty power in any way God may be pleased to send it, and leave the results wholly with God.

In conclusion, let me say again, this is simply suggestive, but that it is offered with the best of intentions.—J. W. W.

BIG REVIVAL IN BALTIMORE.

The revival which began November 14, at Franklin Street Memorial church, Baltimore, Maryland, closed December 19, because of the near approach of the holiday season, with interest unabated. This campaign was in charge of the pastor, Edward W. Leech, assisted by Rev. Leland Windsor of the local church. In preparation for this effort, cottage prayer meetings were held for several weeks, and a half hour of prayer preceeded each service, with the marvelous result that there was not a single service for five weeks in which there was not one or more conversions, total number of conversions 137, with sixty-two accessions till January 1, others to join One feature of the revival was the divine healing service each Thursday evening, which attracted large crowls and many sick and afflicted people. These were prayed for and anointed with oil according to James 5:14, 15, and a large number were instantaneously healed, while others were greatly benefitted, the results always being in proportion to the faith of the sufferer. The lame walked, the deaf heard, eyes blinded by cataract were opened, the dumb spake, and divers diseases were healed by the divine Physician. Mrs. Itzel, of Halethorpe, Maryland, whose case was diagnosed as tumor and gall stones by two physicians, and given but a few days to live, was instantaneously healed, has not suffered any of the annoying symptoms for the past two months, (prayed for on the eve of the campaign) and so testified in recent prayer-meeting. A woman who had been hurt in an automobile accident and as a result had no power to turn her head, the leaders having been severely injured, recovered the full use of inuscles and leaders of her neck, and that without leaving her seat; God heard and answered her prayer as we prayed for others, and she has borne testimony to her healing wherever she has gone. Mr. Atkinson, prominent business man of this city, was assisted into the church by four men. Two men lifted him to the altar where he was placed in a chair, he being unable to walk or kneel, a sufferer from neuritis. His faith was strong, prayer availed, Jesus immediately touched his body. He accepted his healing by faith, rose up and unassisted walked all over the front part of the church, praising God and exclaiming, "Oh how good it feels to walk again!" The entire congregation, either by weeping or rejoicing praised the Lord for such a modern miracle.

These are only a few of many outstanding cases of healing which we have recently witnessed, and for which we thank and praise the Lord. Surely no one will be so skeptical as to doubt the power of God to touch the sick with healing now as in that first century, or to find fault with a people willing to fast and pray in preparation for a gratuitous service rendered in love and sympathy to the sick and afflicted. To us it is all too real to doubt, and has proved a wonderful stimulus to our faith. TheBible teaches divine healing both in the Old and New Testament, Jesus was the Healer of all diseases and afflictions during His earth life. Divine healing was well known and practiced in the early Christian church for several centuries. In these last days Joel's prophecy is being fulfilled and the power of the Holy Spirit is being strangely and mightily manifested with the same attendant signs and wonders as in the apostolic church, to the baptism of the Holy Ghost, which we have witnessed again and again, ever since last January when this church was visited by a mighty revival of religion under the leadership of Mrs Aimee Semple McPherson, the Canadian evangelist, and today there is a well established and deeply spiritual work in several Methodist Episcopal churches, as well as my own church. I have kept quiet, so far as myself and my work were concerned, to test out my owu church and people for almost a year, and to-day I am fully persuaded as to the genuineness of the full gospel program embracing all that I have indicated above, and stand firm in the belief that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and today, and forever,"

and that God's power knows no limitations, except those imposed upon it by our unbelief. I have read the various articles in the Religious Telescope by the editor and several of the United Brethren pastors of Dayton, Ohio, and I have enjoyed and endorsed every favorable word which has come to my notice concerning her sacrificial services. She preaches the whole truth, attracts the crowds, fills the altar with sinners and backsliders. prays down healing for the sick, and seeks to deepen the spiritual life of believers. My church is truly transformed, both pastor and people. Never such large congregations, never such spirituality, never such cooperation, never such Christian love and fellowship, never such results in soul-saving and soulbuilding, never such a helpful ministry to the sick, never such Holy Ghost power, never such victories in church finances, \$2,500 salary and parsonage for the pastor, which includes \$500 increase for this conference year, whereas the salary seven years ago was \$1,000 and home. Members and friends of the church presented pastor with a chech for \$206 at the Sunday-school Christmas exercises, and voted him a rest period whenever he desires to take it. Fine leather traveling bag was presented to Mr. Windsor at the same time, and an offering of \$167 was laid upon the altar for the Quincy United Erethren Orphanage and Home. Tithers are increasing, and every department of the church is in a most flourishing condition. To the great Head of the church be all the praise, honor, and glory for such signal spiritual victories.-Edward W. Leech, Pastor.

GOD'S WONDERFUL WORKS. A Remarkable Meeting.

January 2nd we opened, what has proven to be in many ways, the most remarkable meeting I ever attended. He did the work. To Him only be all the praise. The pastor, himself, was healed in the first part of the series. He only had about twenty parishioners, and they worshiped in a small hall.

Our place of meeting was changed fifteen times, and we spoke in six different places. The weather was very bad, but in spite of this and other obstacles the largest auditoriums we could get were inadequate to hold the crowds that came, representing twelve nationalities, Jews and Gentiles. Foreigners came with their interpreters, and the trouble was not to get them to the altar, but to make room, even for the sick and suffering who came for prayer and healing. Some were brought in arms, and rolling chairs, and others came on crutches, the lame, the blind, deaf-mutes, stiff joints, tuberculosis, cancer, goiters, rheumatism, locomotor-ataxia, epilepsy, paralysis, infantile paralysis, spinal troubles, in casts, stammering tongues, in fact, it made my heart ache to see the work of Satan, and we rejoiced to tell them a sure remedy, Jesus' blood. (Isa. 53: Matt. 8:16, 17.)

One man who looked on at the healing service, where the Lord marvelously and instantly healed many-about the close of the service said to me, "You can heal anything," I told him, "it was the Lord who did the healing." A foreigner who looked on during a healing service stood near and looked serious. I asked, "Do you wish to be prayed with?" and he replied, "I want my heart fixed, so I won't swear and drink any more." He was soon happy in Jesus' love. Glory! A lady brought her little son for healing of a stiff, sore ankle, and when she asked to bring him up for prayer, I asked, "Are you saved?" she said, "No". I told her to kneel by the boy and give her heart to Jesus, and then I would pray for his healing. She fell on her knees and soon prayed through, and when I prayed for the boy he lifted his foot and said, "In the name of Jesus", and began to bend the ankle. An unsaved mother brought a seven year old child, a deafmute, and after the mother was converted the child heard, and the next evening the father was saved and the child spoke. Glory!, A deaf-mute boy nine years old instantly received hearing and speech, and said, "Glory to God," clear and plain. Mrs. Ramsey had arrangements made to go to the hospital for an operation for cancer on Wednesday, but Sunday evening she came to meeting, gave her heart to Jesus, was anointed for healing and instantly the pain left her, and there was no slgn of cancer next morning. Praise the Lord. A colored man eighty-six years of age, who had not walked alone in six years, immediately got up and walked off up the aisle without any aid, but the Lord. A trained nurse who had spent \$3,000 in vain for her hearing was instantly healed, and gave God the glory. Psa. 103.

On account of the crowded conditions

and for scarcity of personal workers to guide seekers we had to make an altar of the whole church for those seeking salvation, and often hundreds expressed a desire to be saved. When sinners see that Jesus is working through us "with signs following", they are convicted and begin to seek forgiveness of their sins. One foreigner who had been healed under my hand came back with his wife and just came up to the front in the First Baptist church and knelt down in front of the large congregation and began to weep and pray and when asked what they wanted, he said, they had left their five children at home alone in the country to come to church and get saved from sin. I feel quite sure there were many more conversions and sanctifications and baptisms in the Spirit, than healings, because in some instances a whole family was drawn closer to God through the healing of one member. A baby was healed of infantile paralysis and the father came up, and said, he wanted his heart fixed. A Jewess was healed instantly and has since accepted the Messiah and her life is transformed. Glory!

Time and space forbid us telling more of the marvelous workings of our God in our midst, but we praise Him, take courage, and press forward expecting greater things in the present meeting at Butler, Pennsylvania, because we remember "Many, O Lord my God, are Thy wonderful works which Thou hast done, and Thy thoughts which are to us-ward: they cannot be reckoned up in order unto Thee: if I would declare and speak of them, they are more than can be numbered."—Mattie E. Perry, in "Way of Faith," (Holiness).

SEATTLE, WASH.

The revival meeting just closed was without doubt the greatest visitation of God's power that the city of Seattle ever witnessed. The meetings were in charge of Evang. A. H. Argue, very ably assisted by his daughter Zelma, and son Watson, of Winnipeg. From the beginning the power of God was specially manifested so that the first day brought precious results in the salvation of souls and the baptism of the Spirit.

The large altar space was crowded continuously for the four weeks of the revival; the scene at times is impossible to describe. Hundreds of weeping, praying people were there, whose sole desire was to get to God. Never have we witnessed such scenes, such humility and public confession of sin; such shouts of victory, such wonderful visions, and baptisms with the Holy Spirit. Many times the meetings continued until six o'clock in the morning and the spirit of prayer was unabated. One night the writer was called up at 2 A. M. by one of the deacons who said, "Another Pentecost has come." The people were slain all over the large auditorium under the mighty power of God.

We shall never know the actual results of this holy gathering. About one hundred received the baptism with the Holy Ghost, each one with the signs following as per Acts 2:4, and hundreds

were at the altar for salvation, the greater part finding Jesus as their Savionr. Some of the most remarkable conversions we ever saw were in evidence at this meeting. The crowds continually increased until the large new Temple Auditorium 60 by 108 feet overflowed and numbers were turned away. Some truly wonderful healings were wrought in the mighty name of Jesus. One woman testified that when prayer was offered she felt the cancer break loose in her throat which she swallowed and it passed away.

Watson was especially used of God in leading the song service with slide trombone, and in preaching the word to the large congregations of the young people. The trombone music by these two consecrated workers was of a very high order and greatly appreciated by all who came. One meeting which started under the direction of Zelma among the children and young people continued all night until six o'clock Sunday morning, followed by the Sunday services when about twenty, mostly young people, received the Baptism during those days. Truly they were "All filled with the Holy Ghost and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave utterance." To God be all the glory.-Pastor W. H. Offiler.

959. Should an assembly ask its pastor to resign when they find out, and he confesses that he has two living wives?

The General Council asks every preacher this question, and refuses to give preachers' credentials to such. Prevention is better than cure. In the future you had better ask this of your candidate for pastor before installing him as pastor. We refuse endorsement to such. Your assembly is free to do likewise, if it agrees with us in this stand.

960. Is regeneration ever spoken of as resurrection?

Personal, individual regeneration is not called resurrection, although we are raised to newness of life in regeneration after the likeness of His resurrection.

Jesus tells the apostles they shall sit in twelve thrones "in the regeneration" judging the twelve tribes of Israel. This does not refer to the new birth of the individual, but to the renewal of all things, including the earth. The resurrection of the saints may be regarded the same as the beginning of this general renewal.

961. We find in John 14:12: "Verily, verily, I say unto you: He that believeth on me the works that I do shall he do also, and greater works than these shall he do." Now I believe if we have faith the works that He did we may do, but what I want to know about is the "greater works" that we can do.

They are greater in extent, in numbers. Jesus won a few hundred converts in about three years by His personal ministry. Peter in one day won three thousand.

'962. Please explain what Paul means in 1 Cor. 15:50 when he says: Flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God.

This refers to the future kingdom after the resurrection. We are then to have glorified bodies like that of our Lord. Our natural bodies of flesh and blood must give place then to this spiritual body.

963. Are the saints to be judged at the White Throne Judgment? If not, where and when are they to be judged?

No. They are to be judged by Christ at His coming for the purpose of assigning them their rewards for service, and their places in the kingdom during the millennium.

964. Does the Bible teach a wife has a right to some of her husband's money? Does it teach that the wife has to earn her own money while keeping house and caring for her husband..

The scriptures teach a man should

care for his wife as his own body, furnish a home, clothing, food, etc., for her just as for himself. If a man is unable to work and has no money and no property it is all right for his wife to work out. But even if sick and he has means she has the same right to be clothed and fed and nursed from it that he has. She should have in addition to this some money for incidentals the same as he does. The scriptures teach a man should provide for his own family and that it he does not he is worse than an infidel The husband who is able to provide for his wife and does not clothe and care for her is a poor piece of flesh. She is doing her part while caring for the home. All he makes while she is doing this is as much hers as it is his. Even if he already owns money or property his marriage to her makes her his partner, and she should have all her needs met by him.

965. If Jesus will reign on earth during the Millennium, where can I find scripture for it?

"Millennlum" simply means a thousand and refers to the one thousand years of Christ's reign on earth. We also shall reign with him during this thousand years. See Rev. 20:1-7.

966. Did Jesus cease to be our advocate when we have been made partaker of the Holy Ghost and have tasted of the heavenly gift as in Heb. 6:4? Is Jesus the propitiation of our past sins only, as in Rom. 3:25, or for future sins, as the Babtists teach?

He does not cease to be our High Priest and Advocate when we are haptized with the Spirit. He is the propitiation for all our sins, past, present or future, if we repent of them, confess and forsake them. Our past sins are never forgiven until we repent and confess our need of Him. He does not promise to forgive any unrepented sins.

967. I want an explanation of "Healing in the Atonement." Do you seperate healing from other supernatural gifts and manifestations, and give it a place in the atonement with salvation, or do you mean to say that the possibility of it is youchsafed by the atonement?

All we get from God today is through the atonement and mediation of Christ on the cross. "He bare our sins" and "bare our sicknesses" (Matt. 8:17), and "by His stripes we are healed." But to make this effective, He ascended on high "and gave gifts to men" (Eph. 4:8). So its possibility is vouchsafed by the atonement, and its operation is made effective by the prayer of faith (Jas. 5:14), by the gifts (1 Cor. 12:9), and by the power of the Spirit.

THE PRECIOUS BLOOD OF CHRIST

"Ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold, . . . but with the precious blood of Christ, as a lamb without blemish and without spot" (1 Pet. 1:18, 19).

Man is wearing himself ont trying to obtain silver and gold, that which the Holy Ghost calls "corruptible." Corruptible things will not redeem your soul. One drop of the precious blood of Jesus Christ is worth more than all the gold in the universe. Blood redeemed the world. Gold corrupts the world. To have a right apprehension of the precious blood you must have the Holy Spirit. It is a serious thing to reject the precious blood. How shall they escape who neglect so great a salvation? How shall they escape who tread under foot the precious blood of Christ?

Gold is exalted on the gilded cross seen on the spires of some of our churches, and the blood of Christ Is trodden under foot on the threshhold of the same churches, the members of which declare, "We are rich and increased in goods and have need of nothing," knowing not that they are wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked. They are rich in themselves and poor toward God. Corrupt gold makes princes beggars. But through faith in Jesus' blood beggars become princes, yea, kings and priests unto God.

The blood of Jesus Christ cleaning your heart can fit you for the abode of God.

You think you can understand the value of the precious blood, hut you never can. Eternity is not long enough to appreciate its worth. Throughout the endless ages it will be a delight to sing: "Unto Him that loveth us, and loosed us from our sins by His blood; and made us to be kings and priests unto God and His Father, be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen."

And we shall reign with Him. Men and women in the world purchase favors by silver and gold and get into high positions. The blood of Jesus can purchase for us the highest position in eternity, where we shall live and reign with Him for ever.

The power of Jesus' blood not only draws the believer from the earth, but links him to the Throne. Redeemed with the precious blood of Christ, as a lamb without blemish and without spot! You may also be without blemish and spot as you trust in the efficacy of the precious blood.

JUST A WORD TO MEMBERS OF THE FAMILY.

This is to advise you of the conditions at the General Council Bible School at Auburn, Nebr., in which you are all interested.

The School is progressing nicely, and the students are rejoicing in this their opportunity to get a working knowledge of the Bible. This is as we hoped and as it should be; But,

The teachers are not being supported as they should be; and this has occasioned this little reminder. None of the teachers have received enough to cover their personal needs while the school has been in operation. Ten dollars a month is the very most that any of them have been given so far. They get their board with the students, out of the student fund, but no more. None of them can continue long at the present rate.

I know that at present it is hard for many of our people on financial lines, but God will help us to sacrifice a bit for the Bible School and the teachers I am sure. Kindly send in an offering for the teachers.

We have two types of church in the world today, the Philadelphia or brotherly love church, and the Laodicean or apostatized church. OPENED HEAVENS

The Conditions.

Jesus sat over against the Treasury (Mark 12:41-44), and He has not changed His attitude, for Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and to-day, and for ever (Heb. 13:8). He saw when the Jews of old offered the blind, sick. and lame (Mal. 1:8), and He also took count when Abraham gave tithes of all (Gen. 14:17-20). What was the result? The Lord said, "Fear not. Ahraham. I am Thy shield and Thy exceeding great reward" (Gen. 15:1). But some may say, "We are not living in the Old Dispensation, therefore what has Abraham's giving of tithes to do with us of the present day?" Abraham is the father of the faithful, and God said concerning him, "For I know him that he will command his children after him" (Gen. 18:19). Isaac doubtless followed his father in this respect, and we read that he sowed and reaped in the same year a hundredfold, and that in spite of famine all around (Gen. 26:12). We have again the same thought in Prov. 3:9-10. "Honor the Lord with thy substance and with the firstfruits of all thine increase, so shall thy barns be filled with plenty."

This is the age of stewardship (Luke 16:12), and God has reserved two things for Himself, one day out of seven, and one tenth of what comes into our hands. The old law was-"This do and thou shalt live," and it included giving tithes. and the New Law is "Live and do this." God gives life that we may do right. "Bring ye all the tithes into the Storehouse that there may be meat in Mine House, and prove Me now herewith, saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it" Mal. 3:10). Again, "Blessed is he that considereth the poor, I will make all his bed in his sickness." The Hebrew is, "I will turn from sickness into health" (Psalm 41:1-3).

And once more . . . "Deal thy bread to the hungry . . . then shall thy light break forth as the morning and thy healing shall spring forth speedily" Isa. 58:7-11). After I had been speaking on this subject once, a sister rose in the meeting and said, "My eyes were opened to this some years ago and I commenced to act accordingly. Almost at once my husband received an increase in his wages. After some time he found out what I was doing and said, 'you must stop that, you shall not throw away my money, and I had to obey. He was a Christian. The following week he had a big reduction in his wages. Soon after he began to feel poorly, and his wife added that he had not worked for six years. He had been receiving health and wages, but although a Christian he had no desire to render

again to the Lord, now he had sickness and inability to work."

Will a man rob God? Pay thy yows unto the Most High and call upon Me in the day of trouble and I will deliver thee and thou shalt glorify Me (Psalm 50:14-15). "Cease to do evil, learn to do well. Seek judgment, relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow." This was the way back to God for a nation and is for the individual. Some will say, "That is law and we are under grace." But Romans 8:4 says. "That the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us. who walk not after the flesh but after the Spirit." If it was right under the law. the law is also to be fulfilled in us. Some will say, "My income is so small now I cannot afford to give a tenth." Now if your God cannot do more with nine parts than you can with ten, then He is not the God of the Bible. But God demands faith and without faith it is impossible to please Him. In 1 Kings 17:8-16, the widow on the verge of starvation was asked to make a cake first for the prophet, and afterwards to make for herself and her son, with the promise that the barrel of meal should not waste, nor the oil fail. In Exodus 16:18, we read concerning the household supplies in the Wilderness wanderings, "He that gathered much had nothing over, and he that gathered little had no lack." Again, Psalm 37:3, 19, "Trust in the Lord and do good, so shalt thou dwell in the land and verily thou shalt be fed. They shall not be ashamed in the evil time and in the days of famine they shall be satisfied." Luke 6:38. "Give and it shall be given unto you, good measure, pressed down, and running over?' Also 2 Cor. 9:6-15, "But this I say, He which soweth sparingly shail reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully."

Have you noticed the Epistle which has the most joy in it and the reason why? Joy is mentioned seventeen times in the short Epistle to the Philippians and these were the Christians who had ministered the most to the Apostle's needs. See Phil. 4:9-19, and the Apostle adds, "Not because I desire a gift, but I desire fruit that may abound to your account. But my God shall supply all your needs according to His riches in Glory by Christ Jesus."

But to return to our former text, "Bring ye all the tithes . . . prove Me." A man told me some time after he had heard me speak on this, "I had a good mind to get up and denounce you as a false prophet, but I said, No, I will try it first. But really isn't it wonderful! Isn't it wonderful! I recommend it now to everybody, widows and all." Yes, our Lord is the same as the One to

whom the lad brought the five barley loaves and two fishes, and He fed 5,000 men besides women and children with them. A man told me he owed a bill. and his wife and he agreed that they should stop their tithes until they had paid this account. "But." said he "my son was taken ill, and we had no victory. then the daughter and then my wife. and still no victory, and we had to get a servant to help. Then I had an accident, and we could see it was because we had withheld from God, that which was meet." Another man thought it was his privilege to be a co-partner with God. but his wife was unwilling because they were in debt. She said, "Pay the debt first." but they could not. Hanging on the wall they had the Motto. "God First," so the husband pointing to it said. "I will take that down, I will not be a hypocrite." The wife then became willing and in a short time they were able to pay the debt as well as pay cash for everything they bought.

Another who felt the Lord was leading her to give Him the tenth said, "I have only ten shillings Lord." "Well," seemed to come the answer, "give one shilling." She afterwards said that she saved more than one shilling in butter and bread alone that week.

Another sister whom I called to see on two occasions said, "Look at my purse. I do not understand it a bit, but I have always plenty of money." Her husband was only earning 27 shillings per week and the rent took 7 of these weekly and they always gave their tenth, and if the husband worked overtime he gave that to the Missionary cause.

A business man to whom I was talking about the time of writing this said to me, "I have been faithful to the tithes ever since you spoke to me four or five years ago. I was always in business difficulties at that time and was in court once. Now I don't owe a penny to any man."

I once knew a business man so clever that several firms put many shares to his name only for him to sit on the management committees. Our Lord is willing to help manage our affairs for one tenth, and we shall have the credit when we get home. After many years' trial I would not change His partnership for all the world. Another man told me, "I could not receive my Baptism in the Holy Ghost and I was not giving my tithes as I did not believe in doing so. But I became convinced that it was right and I made up my mind that I would give the tenth the next Sunday morning and I did so. Directly the meeting commenced I received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit, and found myself speaking in tongues: and the Lord has worked real miracles for me since in my busi-

How are we going to obey the Master's last command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," if we are not going ourselves

Wherefore Then the Law?

(Continued from Page Two.)

Let us notice that "the faith" is what succeeded and displaced "the law" as a dispensation; and that the coming of Christ is the coming of "the faith." Before Christ came, faith looked forward to Him. But now "faith" means nothing other and nothing less than trusting, submitting to, and obeying from the heart, Jesus Christ who was crucified and who rose from the dead. Faith, in the Bible-sense of the word, does not exist apart from Jesus Christ; and the merit of faith lies not at all in the one who exercises it, but wholly and solely in the One believed in. Faith saves wholly and solely because of the merits of the One whom God has given us to believe in, and because of the value and sufficiency in God's eyes of the work accomplished by Him. "The faith" has come; because the Christ of God has come, and has fulfilled all that was written of Him. Hence the dispensation of law has given way to that of grace; and under grace those who are of the faith of Jesus Christ are received into the family of God as sons. "For ye are all the children (or sons) of God by faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as have been baptized into (unto) Christ have put on Christ" (3:26, 27).

. Baptism is here presented as figuratively accomplishing that which it represents-the putting off of the old man (having died to his authority) and the putting on the New Man, Christ Jesus. The death of the believer in association with Christ crucified is the door of escape from the old "bondage" of sin: and his association with Christ in resurrection is his entrance into "the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free." Baptism is both the symbol and the witness on our part of the truth of what has taken place in our spiritual being through faith in Christ Jesus.

In Christ all national distinctions and the like disappear, and the fact that there is but "one baptism," for disciples out of all nations, whether men or women (Matt. 28! 19, 20; Eph. 4:5), is a witness to the truth that all are "one in Christ Jesus." "There (i. e., in Christ) is neither Jew nor Greek; there is neither bond nor free: there is neither male nor female; for ye are all one in Christ" (Gal. 3:28).

Another consequence of being saved by grace through faith in Christ is stated in the next verse: "And if ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed and heirs according to the promise" (29).

We have then these two great things which the grace of God brings to us, namely, present "liberty," and a future "inheritance." Those things naturally attach to sonship. Being sons (as distinguished from bond-servants), we have liberty, and we have also the sure prospect of an inheritance. For "if children then heirs; heirs of God and joint-heirs with Christ" (Rom. 8:17). To the same effect we have in Gal. 4:7, the statement: "Wherefore thou art no more a bond-servant but a son; and if a son,

In all my reading I have never seen in such papers any urging of the sick to call for the elders of the church for the laying on of hands and prayer for their healing according to the divine prescription given in James 5:14, 15.

In nearly all denominational papers much space is given to news and comment, including politics and other questions of the day.

In such papers there is little or no emphasis laid upon the necessity of deep spiritual heart experiences, and little or no encouragement given toward outward expression of the same.

The Pentecostal Evangel has no advertisements except those of Bibles, Bible Schools, song books, religious literature, notices of meetings, conventions, etc.

In every issue of the Evangel I read of numbers of people being healed by the laying on of hands, anointing and prayer, which I believe is the true way of deliverance for the Christian from bodily ills.

In the Evangel only such topics as pertain to the spiritual welfare of the readers are ever considered.

Nearly everything printed in the Evangel is so permeated with the Holy Spirit that a Christian can not read very far in it until he catches the spiritual inspiration that causes him to rejoice in the salvation of Jesus, and to feel and know the joy of the Lord as his strength.

THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS. Jer. 23:6.

In Acts 4:12 we read, "There is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." All scriptures from the beginning point to this truth.

It was God's plan from the foundation of the world. Rev. 13:8; 1 Pet. 1: 19, 20,

Jesus said, "I am the door." 10:7. Unless we see all other doors closed and see that Christ alone is the door, we fail to understand the scriptures.

In Rom. 10:3 we read, "For they (the Jews) being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God." Now the righteousness of God here referred to is the manifestation of Jesus Christ, by which He made atonement for sin, for in 1 Cor. 1:30 we read, "Christ Jesus is made unto us wisdom, and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption."

The Jews, being ignorant of this truth, went about to make themselves righteous, by the observance of days, circumcision, meats, drinks, etc. Unless the people of God can see themselves helpless creatures, sold under sin, (Rom. 7:14) they will endeavor to establish their own righteousness which lies in meats drinks, manner of dress and daykeeping. Then feeling they have pleased God by observing such things, they will judge those who don't, as failing to obey the scriptures, Col. 2:16, 17. And the table (Rom. 11:9) will become a snare and a trap by causing them to put trust in day-keeping, etc., when trust must be in Christ alone.

We all know the ten commandments were written on tables of stone. In 2 Cor. 3:3 we read, "Written not in tables of stone, but in fleshly table of the heart;" and in Rom. 11:9, "Let their table be made a snare and a trap."

Truly the ten commandments with the rest of the law, had their place in the plan of God, but salvation is of the Lord, Psa. 37:39; and it is now high time to declare: The Lord our righteousness. Jer. 23:6.

In Heb. 8:7 we read—the first covenant was not faultless, and in verse 13 it was made old. Now the first covenant was the ten commandments (Deut. 4:13), and the keeping of them every whit did not meet the demands of God: therefore came Jesus Christ, the only means of salvation, who also gave new laws, saying, "It was said by them of old time, (quoting from the ten commandments) Thou shalt not kill; but I say unto you that whosoever is angry with his brother without cause shall be in danger of the judgment." Also in 1 Jno. 3:15 we read, "Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer."

In Matt. 5:27, He says, "It was said by them of old time, Thou shalt not commit adultery; but I say unto you, that whoseever looketh on a woman to lust after her, hath committed adultery." The fourth commandment says, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy," but in Luke 1:75, we find we should serve Him in holiness and righteousness all the days of our life.

The Apostle John says, "The law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ." Jno. 1:17.

Oh! that the end of our conversation might be Jesus Christ. Read Heb. 13: 7, 8. Some after preaching Christ show that the end of their conversation (or preaching) is a desire to have the seventh day kept, or a certain kind of apparel to be worn, or certain things to be or not to be used for food.

VICTORIES IN INDIA.

Miss Almyra Agton writes from India: "Our Christmas was a day of mingled joy and sorrow; sorrow because baby Harvey was so sick, and joy because of the open confession of two village women for Christ. Brother Harvey was having a baptismal service for the children of Christlan parents and two girls from the Zenana, when these two women asked to be baptized also. One was from the vil-lage directly behind our house and the other her sister from the adjoining village. Manganu, the husband of the first one, was walting on the roadway to the place where we baptize and as we all came along he caught his wife and tried by force to take her back to the village. He held to her and there was quite a struggle, she arguing that she would take baptism, she would take the 'nishan' the mark of Jesus would take the hishan the mark of Jesus Christ. She said, 'God has changed my heart and you cannot change it back.' He said, 'You shall not leave me,' and she He said, 'You shall not leave me,' and she replied, 'I'm not leaving you, I'm obeying Jesus Christ and taking His mark because He has changed my heart and I love Him.' I am sure the angels were rejoicing over that testimony. Finally her husband saw he could not turn her back and so he turned to his village and we all went on our way and she was baptized. She went back to her village and next day I went down to see how things were and found her all smiles. I asked if her husband would eat the food she cooked (you know a Hindoo will not touch Christian food) and she said no, that her oldest child cooked food for him.

"Praise God for His Word will not return vold. The Word has been given out for nine years, and it will spring forth and bear fruit. God is blessing in India, and not only in our staton, but in all.

"We were up to Uska Bazaar to visit Miss King and see Miss Lee before she sailed for America. They had a convert, a little girl widow from the village. As we were leaving, the teacher, Miss 'Norton (Indian) was taking this girl to a school. Quite a crowd gathered on the railway platform and were very rude, pushing dear Miss Lee aside and talking to the widowgirl, saying they would take her and give her hundreds of rupees and care for her if she would leave the Christians and come with them. But she stood firmly for Jesus. They asked if the Christians were forcing her to go and she answered, 'No, I go gladly' (kushl se)'.

"Keep praying friends. We are gaining ground in India. Truly mission work pays. Christian love to all."

SAINAM, SO. CHINA.

"The Lord is blessing these days in spite of the awful condition of the country because of the civil war, and many souls are accepting the Gospel. Two girls whose husbands are Kwangsi sodders, are staying in our compound now and want to be baptized as soon as possible. Their husbands were beaten and carried off to jail by the Kwangtund soldiers and they had to flee or they would have been sold as slaves by the soldiers. All their money, good clothing, etc., were taken, and for two nights they fled from one hous, to another for protection. One night they stood crouched over in a ditch all night to conceal themselves. The next day they came here begging us to take them in and protect them. They have been here two months now and believe the Gospel, and I believe they are really saved.

"We also have another refugee over at the Mission. He is a Kwangst soldier who was shot in the left limb by the Kwangstung soldiers at Samshul. He lumped from the boat and swam to the shore, dragging himself into our inquiry room. The soldiers were afraid to enter the inquiry room and search for him, because of the American flag, so he stayed in hiding for two or three days. Later Mr. Kelley went up and brought him down to the Mission here at Salnam where he could be attended to. He was suffering agony from the wound and groaned so at night the

others in the Mission were unable to sleep. They said we must surely get a doctor and have the builet removed. This would cost a goodly sum of money and Mr. Kelley did not feel that we had money to give to doctors when the Lord was able to heal. Mr. Kelley had been ill and unable to attend the services in the chapel, but this evening he felt he should go to anoint this brother and pray for him. After giving him the scripture on healing, we laid hands on him and prayed. He said he felt the bullet turn around and the pain ceased. From that time on the limb began to heal, while before it was swollen and turntng black from the compound here and can walk without even the slightest limp. This is marvelous in the eyes of the Chinese. The Bible women use this incident as a topic when they go to the homes preaching "—Ella E.

Bro. B. S. Moore writes, "Jesus is our victor. He gave us many souls in our fall evangelistic campaign and we had a nice Christmas meeting in which the house was full in two services, first the small children and then the large children and grown-ups. Ten more are waiting for baptism in one village, and a number have been healed. We laid hands on a consumptive in Jesus' name and God healed her, praise His name. A report has come that there are many more accepting the gospel since we were at another point called Ogaw Mura, where we have a preacher working. All are well."

Sister Almyra Aston writes, We had a very pleasant voyage and were only thirty days from Brooklyn to Bombay. We came directly north to Nawabganj to Brother and Sister Harvey's. We were glad to find Miss Parker healed and looking well. Little Victor Harvey, age five months, had a severe cold which developed into bronchitis later. On Christmas eve he was very ill and we were all much in prayer and God touched him and he seemed much better on Monday. On Tuesday, at 4:30 P. M. he left us to be with Jesus, from my arms. We could hardly believe he was gone and kept praying after his last breath, but Jesus knows best, and had taken him out of this world of suffering. Poor Mr. and Mrs. Harvey have buried three bables and have only little Zalda left. She was two years old in December and seems to be a strong, healthy child. She is the sunshine of the whole house.

W. R. Williamson writes from Waitsap. S. China: "At Waitsap there are nearty two thousand soldiers without any head, fled from Kwangtung to this place and who are now living off the business men here. Many people have left the city because It has been rumored that as soon as this lawless band has rested up after their long flight that they will rob this place and burn it to the ground as they nave done elsewhere. We are living in the 91st Dealm these days realling that Psalm these days, realizing that 'The angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear Him to deliver them.' We are having good opportunities however, in spite of all this trouble, and these last few services the mission has been full and the people have listened with the closest at-We have some that are seeking the Baptism and several men came this week from Fong Kong who are very hungry for the Lord. They sald, 'We want to follow your Jesus, but we don't fully understand how to believe on Him.' Several of stand now to believe on him. Several of the business men here are also seeking the Lord. One of them has thrown the idol out of his store and now refuses to sell working and we are holding on in faith that He will pour out His Spirlt upon this place until all those that are halting between two opinions will be persuaded to step out for God."

The Goming Chinese Church.

An article appeared in the Atlantic Monthly recently entitled "The Future of Religion in China". This article, written by a missionary, showed a wonderful grasp of conditions as they are and the possibilities for the future of developing a Chinese Church under Chinese administration. Here are a few extracts which may be of interest:

The day is coming when the spiritual needs of the Chinese people will find their satisfaction in the widespread acceptance of Christianity. Fut that acceptance will come only after the civilization which Christianity breeds has been thoroughly indicated, the missionary Las withdrawn, and the Christian Church in China has become an organization of and by, as well as for, the Chinese."

"It is practically impossible for the Chinese to have real leadership in the churches as long as they remain under foreign direction."

"The days of foreign direction of Chinese Christian churches are numbered.

With the final proof of the superiority of the West, the case for the proponent in China will be complete. But it will be a Chinese Christian, under Chinese direction, with Chinese support, who goes out to set his religion above all others in China. Before the end of the century he should be fairly launched upon his task."

These statements are interesting, particularly in the light of evidence of a similar nature which is being received from our own Pentecostal missionaries who are laboring to develop a Chinese Church for the evangelization of China.

And what is true in China is also true in India. If India is ever to be evangelized, it must be by Spirit-filled Indians backed up by a Spirit-filled and directed Indian Church. As long as the teaching of Christ is a foreign religion it cannot make great headway in either India or When the religion of Jesus Christ is adopted by the Indians and the Chinese themselves, then watch out for a great increase in evangelistic effort and a multitude of souls being gathered into the fold.

Geo. M. Kelley, the Chairman of the Southern China District Council, has this in view and is laboring to develop a Chinese church. When the District Council was organized in South China recently, a Conference was also held among the Chinese workers with great profit, only five white missionaries being present. The photo of this group of Chinese workers appeared in a recent issue of the Evangel. Our hearts should bound with thanksgiving to God as we gaze into these contented faces of Christian Chinese.

It has become necessary to build a chapel in Sainam and so Brother Kelley brought this matter to the Chinese to see what they would do. The response was startling. \$1,000 was subscribed toward a fund for purchasing land and building a church. Brother Kelley could hardly believe his ears when one of the men in the church at Sainam. whom it was thought was very stingy, gave to this church offering \$50.00. A considerable amount more will be needed for this purpose, but we report this incident as an encouragement to the American supporters of the work, and to inform you that the sacrifices that are being made by the members of the Assemblies of God in America are being appreciated by the Chinese Christians in South China.

Mattie Ledbetter also writes us of a similar experience at Fat Shan. The burden of the work has been placed upon the Chinese. Recently it became imperative that a new chapel be built. The thirty-four members of the church at Fat Shan, all poor people, wage earners, voluntarily made subscriptions and when they were counted, it was found that they had subscribed over a thousand dollars. The missionaries could hardly sleep that night for joy. Some subscribed half their wages for a year. They could not give all that was needed, but they have done what they could. It will probably cost \$5,000 to complete the station at Fat Shan. This shows that the Chinese Christians are getting the burden of the work upon them and we can look for some interesting developments in the near future.

Brother W. W. Simpson and coworkers have been in a continuous revival in Western China for many months. They have found that help from America was inadequate to meet the needs of the work, and so they have endeavored to bring the Chinese Christians to see that the burden of carrying on the good work rests upon them. The results are gratifying. Note the letter which follows from Brother Simpson:

Although the phenomenal growth of our work in Northwest China and Tibet has absorbed all our funds and caused us to experience some financial pressure recently,

yet we preise God for it, knowing it is a healthy and scriptural growth and that God who willed the expansion will surely sustain it in some way. This growth and the consequent increase of our financial needs have already resulted in stirring up many of our Chinese saints to pray and search the scriptures to find out God's way of sustentation. They have also afforded me an excellent occasion to present the subject of self-support and self propagation and aiready some excellent results have been obtained and more are in sight. I am praying and hoping that a few of our Bible School students will soon become courageous enough to boldly launch out and build up entirely new work in sole de-pendence on God alone with no foreign aid at all. Such a result would amply repay us for the little financial pressure we have had.

One of the results already obtained is that our oldest assembly, that of the Gospel Garden in the Taochow District, formed in July, 1918, has become entirely self-supporting. The pastor, who has been visiting me recently, having heard the cir-cumstances of our financial pressure, assured me that his assembly would assume responsibility for all their expenses and also help in extension work.

One of our largest country assemblies in the Minchow district, an assembly only seven months old, has just received a donation of a splendid building site from one of its members, valued at \$100, and a promise of about half the sum required to erect an Assembly Hall to hold two hundred people. Another assembly in the Minchow district plans to erect its own hall next year. Just now the Bible School students supply these country assemblies, walking from ten to twenty-five miles each Saturday and returning the same distance Sunday P. M. or Monday. The students receive nothing for these services which are only a part of their training for the Lord's work.

All our missionaries show a readiness to hear as great a share of the financial burden as they are able, and our Chinese brethren are beginning to show a real understanding of the situation and a desire to aid as far as possible. And God is enlarging their vision to take in His great plans not only for Kansu but for adjoining provinces as well. This a This afternoon two young men announced their set-tled conviction that God is calling them, one to Szechuan Province to the south, the other to Szeman Province, far to the east.
The Spirit spoke through a girl of sixteen saying we must send the gospel to the surrounding provinces. He is the best Teacher of all, and we are learning to trust

and obey Him fearless of the consequences. In connection with the close of Bible School for winter, we are having two days of workers' convention in which the Lord is blessing greatly. The Spirit of Sacrifice, so prominent in the Jerusalem Assembly, has been shown them from the Word and confirmed in numerous messages in the Spirit. Also the Lord has by the Spirit appointed many of the students to open new work in various cities and some to work in their home assemblies. Again and again the Spirit has spoken through various students saying that the Lord Himself is the One who alone has authority to appoint the workers, and they must look to Him, not the missionaries, for their call and appointment.

The future of the Chinese Church is glorious in prospect. Pray much for the dear Chinese brethren that God will call them and empower and embolden them so that they will dare to go at the bidding of the Lord to carry this glorious gospel to their own people.

The following paragraph from one of our exchanges is strikingly true:

"Peace has been taken from the earth. and the only place it can be found is in the heart of the child of God."

SUPPORTING THE MISSIONARIES. From a Missionary's Standpoint.

I desire to say that we must by all means fulfill the scriptures in so far as they at all express any policy concerning missionary work. The financial problem is the one which first caused trouble in the Assembly in Jerusalem and it is no wonder it vexes us now. There is no doubt that in that Assembly there was a policy of both freewill offerings and systematic distribution; also, the Spirit encouraged Ilberal, generous, selfsacrificial giving. And when the Apostles were unable to make a thoroughly systematic distribution because of the pressure of other duties, the seven deacons were appointed to bear the entire responsibility of the finances. The object of their appointment was to see to it that NO ONE was overlooked in the distribution.

Should the objection be raised that the object of these offerings in Jerusalem were merely for the support of the local poor and was not for the support of missionary work, I reply that the principle is the same. It is the principle of receiving and distributing the freewill offerings of the saints that we need to know and follow. Besides, I believe, that it was by means of those wonderful spontaneous offerings that were clearly the result of the reception of the Spirit by the Jerusalem Assembly that the funds were provided for that mighty first missionary drive in which they that were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the Word, and assemblies were formed throughout all Judea and Samaria even to Antioch. Those offerings recorded in Acts 2:45 and 4:34, 35. which have never since been duplicated, must have provided sums far too large to have been entirely spent in providing food for those who had none. The Lord knew what was coming and thus provided the travelling expenses of the largest band of missionaries ever sent forth.

Note, that twice it is stated that the distribution was "according to every man's need." Isn't that just the principle the Lord wishes to give us by which to be guided now in the distribution of the saints' offerings? And how can this principle be carried out unless there is some central body of chosen men to whom all the needs of the workers can be made known and who can int telligently distribute the offerings so that every need may be met?

For my part, I am exceedingly thankful for the Missionary Department and its Treasurer, who is also the Secretary in constant communication with all the missionaries, to whom we can make reports which show what our needs are and to what extent they are being met. The great difficulty now is that offerings are insufficient to meet all the known needs. This indicates one of two things, viz., either some of the Lord's money is being withheld by His stewards or else some of us workers are misusing the Local's money. Perhaps both these things are true. Also, there may be partiality on the part of some of the givers toward some favorite workers in whom, for some reason or other, they have confidence.

This gives rise to the designated offerings. In the ideal condition there are no designated offerings, and I believe now we ought to frankly discourage them and gradually work toward the above stated scriptural principle. But until then, we must certainly receive them and use them as designated.

It is easy to find fault with the other fellow and lay the blame on him for our own failures. It was easier for the early Assembly to solve its financial problems than for us because it started right, whereas we have long generations of sectarian habits to overcome. They started perfect and gradually went wrong; we started out very imperfect and are gradually, but oh so slowly, aiming for perfection. It is harder to go up hill than down. So let us not be discouraged with one another nor yet with ourselves. If we can't reach perfection this year perhaps we can next. Let us hope for better things even though we never see them. The very hoping for them will help to bring them .-- W. W. Simpson.

DOING MUCH FOR MISSIONS.

When the fire of God is burning in the soul, whether the people are poor or not, makes no difference, for a way will be found to give to foreign missionary work. There is a small assembly in New York City, composed of about thirty dependable colored people, who are on fire for God. The secretary of this assembly recently reported that during 1920 the total missionary offerings sent to various fields amounted to \$1710.00.

Famine Still Raging in Northeastern China.

Every report received from the famine district in northeastern China is heartbreaking. Thousands are dying from starvation and the efforts of our missionaries are of little avail. This is the month when the crest of the suffering will be reached. From now on there will be a gradual diminishing of famine conditions through better weather conditions, the efforts of relief committees, etc., until the next crop is harvested. But all suffering will not be removed this year and it will take two years for northern China to recover from the dis-

We are cabling our funds to China the first of each month. All famine funds are cabled to the officers of the North China District Council with instructions that the money is to be used by Pentecostal missionaries in the famine districts. These officers know better where to place the funds than we can possibly know here in America. They are also instructed to co-operate with existing agencies for famine relief if it is thought this can be done to better advantage than through our Pentecostal missionaries..

. The first of February we forwarded by cable \$1580.00, together with \$120.00 for Miss Relff, making a total of \$1700.00. The first of March we forwarded \$2000.00. We will also forward all the funds sent to us for this purpose April 1st, which funds will be cabled to North China.

A letter has just been received from a missionary working in the Famine District. Miss Mattie Brann writes,

"We are overwhelmed in trying to save physical lives as well as to break the Bread of Life to these poor dying people. Every hour it is rush, rush, from early morning until late at night. And only late at night is when we can write, and then we are so tired. I cannot go into details, but here are a few facts:

"After thorough investigation it has been found that there are twenty million (20,-

000,000) starving.

"Not enough money has come to begin to save one-tenth of the dying.

"Our quarters are over-crowded now. Our Girls' School had not been built, but we accepted thirty-one girls. Some were living skeletons and could not have lived many more days. We had to be careful in feeding them at first. Trying to arrange another place for the receiving of more girls. But oh, the hundreds of little girls already sold-the money received for them has been

eaten by the other members of the family.

"Every day brings its a story of another death. Oh the sad things we witness and hear each day. Skeletons, frozen hands,

feet and oh such sores.

"We felt we must begin feeding those who came to our doors and at first handed out bread. Then when the snow came, we felt we must give hot food, and we secured large kettles and began cooking rice and millet together, and gave each a howl of steaming hot, nourishing food. The first day we had 180, but the number soon reached 300, and now has gone to over 500 each day, besides our family of girls and other needy ones we are helping all the time. This week we expect to have all ready to take in 100 boys, and in faith in

Him who loves the suffering, take MORE."

A few days after the above letter was received, we received further word from Sister Brann:

"Oh these sad days. If we only had the time to write some heart-rending things we see each day, but we are too busy trying to use every hour in feeding all we can and breaking the Bread of Life to the hundreds. Thus far we have been enabled, through the gifts of God's children, to keep alive more than 1500 people. We are now taking in boys. Have over 100. Can take 160. The city officials have turned a take 160. The city officials have turned a Confucius temple over to us and as fast as we can arrange for it we are taking in the boys. In a few days we will have room for 100 more girls. Do pray God to send to us those who will become His. Pray for us and our Chinese workers. We are tired physically—but God. Hallelujah!" physically—but God. Hallelujah!" The above letters speak for them-

selves. It is reported that three cents a day will save a life. Lo not send us your regular missionary offerings for famine relief, the missionaries on other fields need those offerings, but do something special for God - make some special sacrifice. We will forward your offerings to the field in the quickest possible way and the money will be used prayerfully in a manner that will do the greatest possible good for the relief of the suffering of the Chinese people and the preaching of the Gospel to them as well .- J. MISSIONARY PARTY ARRIVES SAFELY

The missionary party for the French Sudan has arrived in safety at Ouagadougou (pronounced Wogadoogoo), French West Africa, according to a cable received re-cently. The party, consisting of Bro. and Sister Wright, Brother and Sister Leeper, Miss Jennie Farnsworth and Miss Margaret Peoples, was compelled to travel over the same terrible route over which Prother Taylor passed some months ago, a full re-port of which was published in the Evan-gel, and some anxiety was felt for the party. However, the tension has been re-lieved by the report of their safe arrival and we have great occasion for praise unto Lord.

Brother Wright wrote us from Bamako, just before the party started on the last lap of the journey which nearly proved so fatal to Brother Taylor, but for the mercy

of God.
"We arrived here on the 11th inst., after a very pleasant journey for five days on the Niger river. We were entertained by the Alliance missionaries for some eight days at Baro, while the arrangements were being made for boats to make the trip, and the Lord graciously blessed our fellowship. The enemy would try to hinder at different times, but the Lord has always undertaken and we believe that nothing will be able to stop our progress providing we keep close to the Guide. One of the party was attacked with fever at Baro (Miss Peoples), and it looked as if the arrangements for the boats would be upset, but at this time the dear Lord made possible what seemed impossible.

"We are sure all of your hearts would have rejoiced if you could have stood in the background and have seen the natives gather around us as we would set the little portable organ on the river bank and sing songs of praise unto the Lamb of God, both in their and our own languages And all along the way, even at railroad stations,

it was our privilege to testify of God's love.
"While on the two days' journey from
Conskry to Baro, by railroad, a paramount
chief of the Susu tribe, came to our window and said that he had heard that there were American missionaries on the train. After greeting us he asked us if we would not come and make our headquarters in his kingdom. On our refusal, he asked if other missionaries could not be sent to his place: The Susu tribe is a large tribe, partly in the English protectorate and partly in the French Guinea, without one missionary in the whole tribe. Pray for these thousands of souls.
"We have repacked here and arc ready to

leave early in the morning on the railroad for Koulikoro, where we get a boat to Mopti. From there we start our long Journey on foot to Ouagadougou. The thing that grieves our hearts is that from Bam-ako on we cannot speak the language of ako on we cannot speak the language of the natives and there are thousands around us who do not know the name of Jesus. Please pray especially that the Lord will open up our understanding to the grasping of the Mossi language for His glory. "We are trying our best to work with the thought that this is our last term or

chance to snatch precious souls from the enemy before Jesus comes. Surely He will

not delay much longer.
"We all want to express our thanks and appreciation for the willing co-operation of the dear ones at home in this great privllege of witnessing for Jesus in the dark, dark Sudan.-H. M. Wright.

FINLAND .- We seldom hear about the Pentecostal work that is going on in the Scandinavian countries and in Finland. A returned missionary from China to Finland writes to me very encouraging news about the work amongst the Finnish people. This dear brother, Rev. William Pylkkanen, lives in Helsingfors, the largest city in the country. Helsingfors, the capital of Finland, is located on the Gulf of Finland. Finland is a republic now, having her own president, having been made free from the Russian dominion and being recognized now as an independent country. Much more could be said about the people and Pentecostal work, but space will not allow me to do so in the precious Pentecostal Evangel.

Brother W. Pylkkanen writes me personally that he has baptized two brothers and seven sisters in water; two of the baptzed ones had been very strong members of the Lutheran church-which is the State Church in Finland. He said that these two were strong believers in infant baptism, but the truth having been preached to them they were convinced and persuaded by the Holy Spirit that immersion is the right kind of baptism. Brother Pylkkanen is doing much traveling, and wherever he goes doing much traveling, and wherever he goes the people are very hungry and receptive of the truth. People are getting saved and baptized with the Spirit all over. Bro. P. says that he went to a certain country place in a snow storm, but in spite of the storm people were so hungry that they came to meetings. The prayer of the saints there is for more laborers in the vineyard. Only a few are willing to go to the country places, where the need is tremendous. desire out there is that the saints in America might pray and intercede for Finland.

I believe it was about 1912 when the

Latter Rain began to fall in Finland. Bro. Gerhard Smidt of St. Paul, Mlnn., U. S. A., was called to go to Finland, and the result was that God began to work in Pentecostal power, many receiving their baptism in the Holy Spirit with Bible evidence of speaking in tongues. Since then the Lord the ministers in the State Church have accepted Pentecost and left the church, her mansions and luxuries, and are preaching the blessed gospel of Christ with Fente-costal power, praise the Lord! Brother Pylkkanen at that time was working in China as a Lutheran missionary, under the board, but when he received the Pente-costal baptism, he had to drop his board, and come back to Finland to work in the Pentecostal Spirit, the Lord using Him blessedly.

They now have two Finnish Pentecostal papers published. And if I remember hav-ing heard aright, they have four Pentecos-tal missions now in the city of Helsingfors; beside this they have missions in almost every city.

Finland is not a heathen country, but it is a very needy field just the same, and needs many consecrated men and women who are willing to work for the Master. There is no foreign country or heathen land to the Lord; He is interested in all the countries and He is wanting us to pray for all these needy places.
